




<u>Caravaggio: A Life Sacred and Profane* by Andrew</u> <u>Graham-Dixon</u>


A comprehensive and accessible biography tracing Caravaggio's dramatic life and artistic development, with particular insight into his Sicilian years.

A literary and atmospheric biography, rich in detail and speculation, focusing on the myth and mystery surrounding Caravaggio's final period.



The Art of the Heist* by Myles J. Connor Jr.


Memoir of an art thief involved in high-profile cases. Offers an insider perspective into the use of art as underworld currency.

<u>The Day of the Owl (Il giorno della civetta)* by</u> <u>Leonardo Sciascia</u>


An early and bold literary investigation into Mafia influence and societal silence.



Midnight in Sicily* by Peter Robb


Nonfiction exploration of politics, justice, violence, and even Caravaggio in modern Sicilian history.
